

I write to endorse the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the South Carolina Ports Authority's proposed deepening of the Charleston Harbor to 52 feet. This project is essential to South Carolina's economic well-being.

As a member of the General Assembly, I join with the Governor, business groups and other stakeholders to demonstrate statewide support for harbor deepening. In 2013, the General Assembly, in a bipartisan vote, set aside the state's share of the estimated funds needed for the project. South Carolina is the only state to have taken this step. This move shows that our state, long known for its robust political climate, has come together in a unique and tangible way to support harbor deepening.

I have confidence in the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' Draft Integrated Feasibility Report and Environment Impact Statement, which finds the project can be accomplished in an environmentally responsible manner. Failure to deepen the harbor to accommodate post-Panamax vessels around the clock would impact statewide efforts to create jobs and improve quality of life.

We, the undersigned members of the Anderson County Legislative Delegation, do hereby endorse and support the Charleston Harbor to be deepened to 52 feet. Because our ports directly or indirectly support one of every eleven jobs in our state, this project is crucial for our continued economic well-being and we feel that this project is a game-changer for our state.

There are numerous facts that make up our decision to support this project and we believe the number one fact is that there are 260,000 jobs across South Carolina that are tied to the port which creates a \$45 billion-a-year economic impact for our state.

Charleston currently receives seven post-Panamax vessel calls weekly and already handles these ships of this size with tidal restrictions and the deepening of the this Harbor will increase vessel calls and allow Charleston to handle these ships regardless of tide. Our state has become one of the fastest-growing regions of the country and we need this project to accommodate the fully-loaded post-Panamax vessels which will weigh more and increase our trade with other countries. Our state has a vibrant and growing manufacturing sector but the US container trade is expected to be export-dominant by 2020. Because export containers are typically heavier than import containers, the additional depth would also accommodate these fully-loaded post-Panamax vessels and would definitely be an asset to our manufacturing trade. We also believe, according to the Corps that the deepening of this Harbor will be done in an environmentally responsible manner.

Another factor is that this project will allow Charleston to move more cargo on newer ships which will have a positive impact on our air quality.

Also, the General Assembly has set aside the full estimated state share of the deepening costs in 2013 and we believe this is likely the best value for public funds.
