# B. CHARACTERISTICS OF TRIBUTARY (THAT IS NOT A TNW) AND ITS ADJACENT WETLANDS (IF ANY):

This section summarizes information regarding characteristics of the tributary and its adjacent wetlands, if any, and it helps determine whether or not the standards for jurisdiction established under *Rapanos* have been met.

The agencies will assert jurisdiction over non-navigable tributaries of TNWs where the tributaries are "relatively permanent waters" (RPWs), i.e. tributaries that typically flow year-round or have continuous flow at least seasonally (e.g., typically 3 months). A wetland that directly abuts an RPW is also jurisdictional. If the aquatic resource is not a TNW, but has year-round (perennial) flow, skip to Section III.D.2. A wetland that is adjacent to but that does not directly abut an RPW requires a significant nexus evaluation. Corps districts and EPA regions will include in the record any available information that documents the existence of a significant nexus between a relatively permanent tributary that is not perennial (and its adjacent wetlands if any) and a traditional navigable water, even though a significant nexus finding is not required as a matter of law.

If the waterbody<sup>4</sup> is not an RPW, or a wetland directly abutting an RPW, a JD will require additional data to determine if the waterbody has a significant nexus with a TNW. If the tributary has adjacent wetlands, the significant nexus evaluation must consider the tributary in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands. This significant nexus evaluation that combines, for analytical purposes, the tributary and all of its adjacent wetlands is used whether the review area identified in the JD request is the tributary, or its adjacent wetlands, or both. If the JD covers a tributary with adjacent wetlands, complete Section III.B.1 for the tributary, Section III.B.2 for any onsite wetlands, and Section III.B.3 for all wetlands adjacent to that tributary, both onsite and offsite. 

## C. SIGNIFICANT NEXUS DETERMINATION

A significant nexus analysis will assess the flow characteristics and functions of the tributary itself and the functions performed by any wetlands adjacent to the tributary to determine if they significantly affect the chemical, physical, and biological integrity of a TNW. For each of the following situations, a significant nexus exists if the tributary, in combination with all of its adjacent wetlands, has more than a speculative or insubstantial effect on the chemical, physical and/or biological integrity of a TNW. Considerations when evaluating significant nexus include, but are not limited to the volume, duration, and frequency of the flow of water in the tributary and its proximity to a TNW, and the functions performed by the tributary and all its adjacent wetlands. It is not appropriate to determine significant nexus based solely on any specific threshold of distance (e.g. between a tributary and its adjacent wetland or between a tributary and the TNW). Similarly, the fact an adjacent wetland lies within or outside of a floodplain is not solely determinative of significant nexus.

B. ADDITIONAL COMMENTS TO SUPPORT JD: The project area addressed in this form contains 30.08 acres located north of and adjacent to Highway 701 North in Loris, SC. On-site are 1.42 acres of jurisdictional wetlands directly abutting 9, 233 L.F of PRPW. The remainder of the site was determined to be uplands. The tributary was determined to be a PRPW with perennial flow by review of aerial photographs, Horry County LiDAR, and USGS topographic maps. Aerial photos depict a well-defined channel with uninterrupted flow into Spring Branch, the USGS topographic maps depict a solid blue line feature which is the symbol for perennial flow, Horry County LiDAR depicts low elevations and a defined channel. Based on the previously mentioned evidence, this perennial RPW was determined to have flow at least 90% of the year under normal conditions. The wetland evaluated in this determination is contiguous and abuts the perennial RPW. Aerial photos show a property as cleared upland area. USGS topographic survey information within the Loris Quad depicts a cleared area with blue line features present. A blue line is symbol for a Perennial RPW. Not all linear features present on the topo map were observed in the field as noted by the agent. The project area is comprised of the partially hydric soil Echaw and the non-hydric soil Kenansville. NWI maps depict cropland/pasture (U21) and ditched/drained forested wetlands (PFO1Bd). Also present on site are upland excavated ditches that provide no hydrologic connection to any other WOUS.
