MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: US Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) Pre-2015 Regulatory Regime Approved Jurisdictional Determination in Light of *Sackett v. EPA*, 143 S. Ct. 1322 (2023),¹ SAC-2024-00847, (MFR# 1 of 1)²

BACKGROUND. An Approved Jurisdictional Determination (AJD) is a Corps document stating the presence or absence of waters of the United States on a parcel or a written statement and map identifying the limits of waters of the United States on a parcel. AJDs are clearly designated appealable actions and will include a basis of JD with the document.³ AJDs are case-specific and are typically made in response to a request. AJDs are valid for a period of five years unless new information warrants revision of the determination before the expiration date or a District Engineer has identified, after public notice and comment, that specific geographic areas with rapidly changing environmental conditions merit re-verification on a more frequent basis.⁴ For the purposes of this AJD, we have relied on Section 10 of the Rivers and Harbors Act of 1899 (RHA),⁵ the Clean Water Act (CWA) implementing regulations published by the Department of the Army in 1986 and amended in 1993 (references 2.a. and 2.b. respectively), the 2008 Rapanos-Carabell guidance (reference 2.c.), and other applicable guidance, relevant case law and longstanding practice, (collectively the pre-2015 regulatory regime), and the Sackett decision (reference 2.d.) in evaluating iurisdiction.

This Memorandum for Record (MFR) constitutes the basis of jurisdiction for a Corps AJD as defined in 33 CFR §331.2. The features addressed in this AJD were evaluated consistent with the definition of "waters of the United States" found in the pre-2015 regulatory regime and consistent with the Supreme Court's decision in *Sackett*. This AJD did not rely on the 2023 "Revised Definition of 'Waters of the United States," as

3. REVIEW AREA.

- a. Project Area Size: 48.99 acres
- Center Coordinates of the review area: Latitude: 33.8404°, Longitude: -78.8753°
- c. Nearest City: Nixonville
- d. County: Horry

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e. State: South Carolina

The review area is a 48.99-acre site with 4.57 acres of delineated jurisdictional wetlands. Portions of the site are open agricultural land. Other portions of the review area are forested, developed with a residential house and other buildings, and an upland excavated ornamental pond. Also onsite are two (2) upland excavated ditches determined to drain only uplands and one isolated non-jurisdictional wetland totaling 0.08 acre. The review area is surrounded partially by development and open agricultural land.

- 4. NEAREST TRADITIONAL NAVIGABLE WATER (TNW), INTERSTATE WATER, OR THE TERRITORIAL SEAS TO WHICH THE AQUATIC RESOURCE IS CONNECTED. The nearest TNW which the onsite freshwater wetlands flows to is the Waccamaw River.
- 5. FLOWPATH FROM THE SUBJECT AQUATIC RESOURCES TO A TNW, INTERSTATE WATER, OR THE TERRITORIAL SEAS:

Jurisdictional Wetland 1 is contiguous to an offsite un-named tributary which flows west to its confluence to Tilly swamp (tributary) which flows south to its confluence with Tilly Lake which outfalls directly into the Waccamaw River, a TNW.

The review area contains two (2) upland excavated ditches totaling approximately +/- 1,250 linear feet. These features are identified as Non-Jurisdictional Ditches on the associated wetland sketch. These features were determined to have been excavated wholly in and draining only dry lands and do not carry a relative permanent flow of water.

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Non-Jurisdictional Wetland 1 The project area contains one isolated nonjurisdictional wetland totaling 0.08 acre. This wetland was assessed and determined to be isolated non-jurisdictional with no continuous surface connection to any jurisdictional waters. The depressional wetland exhibited hydric soils, hydrophytic vegetation, and indicators of hydrology, which satisfied the criteria set forth in the 1987 Corps' Wetland Delineation Manual and the Atlantic and Gulf Coastal Plain Regional Supplement. All water located within or draining toward this wetland has no discernible or traceable outfall or connection to any Waters of the US (WOUS). Additionally, the topographic map depicts this wetland as forested uplands. Aerials photographs depict this wetland as forested, and review of LiDAR data revealed that no linear drainage features within the delineated boundary of the delineated wetland. The NWI depicts the wetland as uplands.
